2025 TRAVEL POLICY

When travel is required for Classis business, the onus is on the individual to make a cost effective and practical choice when considering transportation.

The following options are available;

- 1. Personal Vehicle: With shorter trips, using your own vehicle is generally the best option. Classis pays mileage as established annually by the CRA. 2025 rates are \$0.72/km for the first 5000 km and \$0.66/km thereafter. (Rates are reviewed annually)
- 2. Carpooling: When possible and as with your personal vehicle, carpooling is often a logical, convenient and cost effective option. CRA rate apply
- 3. Car Rental: On longer trips (over 300km return) a car rental is best. Some rental firms will drop the vehicle at your home or pick you up. Review your insurance for proper coverage.
- 4. Bus Charter: At times the Classis will arrange for a bus charter to accommodate a larger number of travellers. When a charter is made available, the Classis will only pay mileage to and from the point of bus origin or stopover. Again the carpooling guideline applies.
- 5. Air Travel: When distances are excessive, such as for our churches in Saskatchewan, air travel is both a time saver with an often reasonable costs when considering the distance.

2025 ACCOMODATIONS POLICY

When accommodations are required for Classis business, the policy of the Classis is to rent single room accommodations. It is expected the individual will make a cost effective and practical choice.

The Classis Interim Committee will ordinarily make accommodation arrangements when multiple rooms are required for a Classis meeting. When this is the case, details will be made available in advance of the meeting.

The following options are available;

- 1. Hotels. Single hotel rooms are the preferred choice of Classis
- 2. Shared hotel room Both parties must agree to shared accommodations. This is an acceptable option.
- 3. You are free to arrange your own accommodations at your own expense.

Covenant for Officebearers in the CRCNA

We, [the undersigned], believe the Holy Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments to be the inspired Word of God, which proclaims the good news of God's creation and redemption through Jesus Christ. Acknowledging the authority of God's Word, we submit to it in all matters of life and faith.

We affirm three creeds—the Apostles' Creed, the Nicene Creed, and the Athanasian Creed—as ecumenical expressions of the Christian faith. In doing so, we confess our faith in unity with followers of Jesus Christ throughout all ages and among all nations.

We also affirm three confessions—the <u>Belgic Confession</u>, the <u>Heidelberg Catechism</u>, and the <u>Canons of Dort</u>—as historic Reformed expressions of the Christian faith, whose doctrines fully agree with the Word of God. These confessions continue to define the way we understand Scripture, direct the way we live in response to the gospel, and locate us within the larger body of Christ.

Grateful for these expressions of faith, we promise to be formed and governed by them. We heartily believe and will promote and defend their doctrines faithfully, conforming our preaching, teaching, writing, serving, and living to them.

Along with these historic creeds and confessions, we also recognize the witness of *Our World Belongs* to *God: A Contemporary Testimony* as a current Reformed expression of the Christian faith that forms and guides us in our present context.

We also promise to present or receive confessional difficulties in a spirit of love and fellowship with our brothers and sisters as together we seek a fuller understanding of the gospel. Should we come to believe that a teaching in the confessional documents is not the teaching of God's Word, we will communicate our views to the church, according to the procedures prescribed by the Church Order and its supplements. If the church asks, we will give a full explanation of our views. Further, we promise to submit to the church's judgment and authority.

We honor this covenant for the well-being of the church to the glory of God the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.

Safe Church Coordinator Report Classis Southern Alberta/Saskatchewan October 2025 Classis

It is that time of year when change is in the air. As the new season starts there are new faces and new ministries and sometimes, we say goodbye to leaders and see programs reach the end of their viability. Through it all we see the faithfulness of God and His provision for His church.

There has been a change in leadership in the denominations' Safe Church ministry with Amanda Benckhuysen leaving her position and Julia Rathbun assuming the role. Julia has been working with Safe Church prior to this change and is a familiar face, making the transition a bit smoother.

Over the past few months I have worked with a few churches on questions around Safe Church training and it is my plan to arrange a gathering of some sort (whether in person at a Classis meeting or via ZOOM) with the local church Safe Church coordinators to share ideas, ask questions and learn from each other. It is helpful to know that others may have the same questions, concerns etc. I have requested the contact information from all of the clerks in our Classis and plan to make this a priority in the coming weeks.

I have also reached out to the Safe Church coordinator of Classis Alberta North to see if there are any opportunities we can work together on to provide training and support.

Training is the number one request that keeps coming up in conversations. Therefore, I am asking for an increase in this years Safe Church budget (from \$500 to \$1200) to allow for me to attend an annual training event put on by Classis Huron in March. This short conference is highly recommended by those who have attended, and I feel that it would be helpful. The conference is one day in early March in Waterloo, Ontario. The costs involved would be the flights and accommodation.

In closing I'd like to remind everyone that this is a good time to review your Safe Church policy not only with your volunteers and council but also with your insurance company. One church recently had an audit done by their insurance carrier and it was a good process as it confirmed their coverage needs and they were able to make the proper adjustments to their policies. Each church has different needs, and your insurance agent can be a helpful source to ensure proper coverage in the event of claims.

Thrive – Thriving Essentials

Classis Meeting October 2025

Dear Classis,

For this update, I would like to focus on Thriving Essentials, a course for all churches, a course designed to equip the ministry leaders and members in your church. Churches are and should be dynamic, seeking to reform and transform as they carry out their mission in the places they are planted. That dynamic will have mountain top moments but also its valley moments. People come and go. The mission may change. Events happen and change us. They move us and demand of us to adapt while keeping the focus on God's purpose and will and seeking to fulfill His mission. These changes often generate questions for leadership as how to adapt and what to do next. This is where Thriving Essentials, with its focus on mission, discipleship, discernment, and leadership, will work alongside churches to discern next steps and spur deeper conversations about ministry in a congregation's local context.

Thriving Essentials is a four-hour course, offered in-person at your church or via Zoom. The infographic below briefly describes the core aim of each essential element. As each element is explored within a congregation's ministry context, church leaders and interested members discover and define together their unique missional identity, striving to encourage engagement in God's mission while ensuring discipleship and practicing discernment, with the aim to also grow present and future leaders within a congregation.

The first of two bottle drives was held in the main parking lot of the college in July. The second will be held on August 5th.

Dear Stated Clerk

As a covenant community of churches, part of our responsibility is to ensure that the work we have committed to doing together is done well and in a timely fashion. Another part of our shared responsibility is to find ways to pay for it, and to adjust things as necessary in the face of ever-increasing costs to do the same work.

For the past few years, the CRCNA has seen a decline in overall giving towards our shared costs via ministry shares. This has made it harder to maintain and budget for our essential costs of being in community together. In February, the Council of Delegates approved the creation of a COD Task Force to consider ways to reduce CRCNA governance costs, fund synod, and use time more wisely.

This task force met over the past six months to consider the big picture of CRCNA governance, including programming and staff costs. They presented an interim report to Synod 2025 (*Acts of Synod 2025*, p. 474-478), and on September 4, the COD held a special meeting in order to review the draft final report, make recommendations, and present information to churches and classes with enough notice for robust review and conversation in the lead up to Synod 2026 (See news story).

I am now sharing that report and the COD's recommendations with you. The COD is recommending that Synod 2026 approve:

- That synod meet every other year beginning in 2027, and that synod direct the COD to
 provide specific recommendations to Synod 2027 about the changes to the candidacy
 process, process for approving key denominational leadership, and other matters which
 are currently handled by synod annually. During the "off" years, other gatherings of CRC
 people such as regional, agency, or inter-classis events would be encouraged.
- That synod establish a one-year task force, working in close coordination with the classes, to review the current classis structure and make recommendations to Synod 2027 for potential classis consolidations and/or overall restructuring.

The COD decided not to refer to a third recommendation to synod about establishing an annual assessment for classes to provide funding for synod and COD. In addition, the COD did not disband this taskforce and, instead, asked for an additional report at their meeting in October.



Please consider this draft report and its recommendations at an upcoming meeting. Should you wish to express support, recommend changes, or propose alternatives to these recommendations, your overtures and communications are due to the synodical services office (synod@crcna.org) by March 15, 2026.



Dear Leaders of CRCNA classes:

Greetings in Christ's name. We pray that you are experiencing God's grace at the beginning of this new ministry year.

Sixty-six years after the destruction of Jerusalem, the prophet Haggai received a message from the Lord for Zerubbabel (the grandson of King Jehoachin) and Joshua, son of Jozadak (the high priest). These two exilic leaders had been called by God to return to Jerusalem to rebuild the temple and renew the worship of the Lord, but sixteen years had passed, and in the face of intractable opposition and dwindling resources, building was at a standstill.

The Lord's message was simple: "'But now be strong, Zerubbabel,' declares the Lord. 'Be strong, Joshua son of Jozadak, the high priest. Be strong, all you people of the land,' declares the Lord, 'and work. For I am with you'" (Haggai 2:4). The Lord had called them to this task and he would provide. The people only needed to work. Four years later the Second Temple was completed and dedicated to the Lord.

After a difficult period of COVID and three years of difficult conversations around sexuality, God is calling our congregations and classes to a time of rebuilding and renewal. Though we face challenges, God's message to us is the same: Be strong and work.

Synod 2025 was focused on the theme of, "Journeying with Jesus" on the path of renewal. As you seek to be strong, and to continue the journey with Jesus in your work, please take a few minutes to consider some of these important steps coming out of Synod 2025.

Next Steps on the Journey of Renewal

Synod 2025 received a summary of the results (<u>Acts of Synod 2025</u>, p.509) of the <u>Gather Initiative</u>, a series of ten gatherings of members and leaders from all 49 of our CRCNA classes (633 CRC leaders and members in total) that took place in 2024 and 2025. These events taught us many things about what God is already doing to renew the church. Synod encouraged classes and congregations to commit themselves to intentional prayer for the renewal of the CRCNA in 2025-2026. Resources to equip your classis in engaging with the results will be coming to you this month.

The Spirit's work of renewal begins with the heart, and we will be providing prayer and worship resources that classes and congregations can use this ministry year. Secondly, Synod 2025 requested that classes reflect on the results of Gather and share your feedback with denominational staff. This feedback will be invaluable in developing the "comprehensive unified strategy and plan" that we trust God to use to renew our congregations (*Acts of Synod 2023*, pp. 975-976). The final result will come to Synod 2026 for endorsement and dissemination.

Renewal in Church Planting

As part of its church renewal conversation, Synod 2025 spent time discussing church planting. We rejoice in God's provision of increased numbers of church plants in the CRCNA, especially among our immigrant leaders. Synod celebrated this positive development and declared, "Church planting is a key strategy in building the health and vitality of our denomination."

However, synod also acknowledged some changes. Church planting has always been a collaborative ministry partnership between a calling church (or churches), the classis, and Resonate Global Mission, our denominational mission agency. While this continues to be true, synod recognized that each partner has specific roles to play in this relationship. Resonate Global Mission supports church planting through recruitment, training, and advocacy for planters. Financial support for specific church plants, however, must come from the local calling churches and classes.

Synod 2025 encouraged classes to connect with Resonate on church planting, reach out to church planters to learn if they have adequate support, and develop (or strengthen) a church planting strategy in partnership with Resonate. In classes with few church plant opportunities, people may wish to extend financial support to other classes where there is greater need.

Synod also instructed the Office of General Secretary to coordinate with all classes and agencies "to develop a vision, plan, strategy and financial proposal for church planting for the CRCNA for the next decade" and report back to Synod 2026. The plan will specify the numbers of plants, the leadership development strategy, and the material resources needed.

Brothers and sisters, this calling to renew and rebuild the CRC through church planting is a large and consequential task, not unlike that of Zerubbabel and Joshua. Resonate Global Mission staff will be reaching out to classes this fall to share some important next steps. In the meantime, please review this synodical instruction and join us in prayer for this work.

We want to conclude with a few brief notes.

• The Office of General Secretary has made a helpful <u>FAQ document</u> containing a summary of synodical decisions. The *Acts of Synod 2025* has been published since the end of July, 2025.

- Synod 2025 made several relatively minor adjustments to Church Order Art. 5 Supplement and to the practice of affirming the Covenant for Officebearers at classis. More details can be found in the FAQ.
- Synod received two taskforce reports this year (see Agenda for Synod 2025), one on assisted suicide and one on virtual churches. You can read a summary of these reports and recommendations in the <u>FAQ</u>. The assisted suicide report includes helpful pastoral advice. The virtual church report encourages churches to network with other congregations and classes as they experiment with this type of ministry.
- Be on the lookout for an email from the Office of General Secretary requesting information about any congregations in your classis that may be involved in church planting, leadership training, and affiliation with churches outside of North America. This is part of the work of our Global Vision Implementation Team coming from Synod 2024.

May God bless you with strength and wisdom as he renews your classis and congregations,

GREETINGS DEACONS & CHURCHES!

Being a deacon has changed over the last number of years.

Years ago, deacons were typically young and were all men. They met in smoke-filled consistory rooms in church basements. Their primary tasks were preparing the offering schedule, collecting and counting the money, and perhaps once a year delivering fruit baskets to the seniors in the church. And there was the assumption that after being a deacon once or twice, you move on to becoming an elder.

Today, in 2025, being a deacon is quite different, wouldn't you agree?

Managing the offerings and visiting the seniors is still happening but the deacon's scope is no longer just <u>in</u> the church: it has moved into the community as well.

Deacons are being confronted with increasingly complex situations without necessarily having the skills and experience to appropriately deal with them:

 We've heard stories of senior members being groomed by scammers and unwittingly transferring the majority of their retirement funds into an account that promptly disappears. After some weeks of shame and embarrassment, they've approached their deacons. What do you do?



- Deacons are often asked to help with rent but what if you learned that a person has been caught up in a Payday Loan that is pulled out of his weekly pay cheque, leaving barely nothing to live on? What's the next, best step?
- Several deacons have shared how they now have a very aged membership and the deacons are being asked to do more with the seniors. What do you need to know about dementia and alzheimer's?

Every day, deacons across Canada lead the way in compassion and mercy, justice, and stewardship. But they can't do it alone. This is where Diaconal Ministries comes in!

We offer ongoing support, training, and encouragement to help deacons thrive in their roles and lead lasting change.

Canadian Indigenous Ministry Committee report - Fall 2025

The Canadian Indigenous Ministry Committee has the specific role of educating and mobilizing CRC members and congregations to live in reconciled relationships as covenant (treaty) people before our Creator with a focus on reconciling the relationship between Indigenous people and non-indigenous people in Canada.



Hearts Exchanged is a learning journey designed to lead CRC members on a path to improved relations with their Indigenous neighbors. Hearts exchanged is continuing this fall with an East-West online cohort. People are also being encouraged to establish in-person cohorts within their local communities and churches. For the first time, 'community of practice' cohorts are being established for Hearts Exchanged Alumni who want to advance their reconciliation journeys. Ministry staff will support these cohorts in their endeavors to build



relationships with their Indigenous neighbors. Exchanges with peer-congregations will enhance the sharing of ideas, best practices and resources. Grants for appropriate local initiatives such as book studies, hosting Indigenous speakers and participating in local Indigenous events will be available.

CRC Indigenous Ministries recently hosted a training session for the **Kairos Blanket Exercise**, and we are grateful to now have many trained facilitators across Canada. The Blanket Exercise is a powerful interactive learning experience that explores the history and ongoing impact of colonization from an Indigenous perspective. We encourage CRC congregations to consider hosting a Blanket Exercise in your church, workplace, or community as a step toward truth, reconciliation, and healing.

Hearts Exchanged Alumni and current participants took advantage of two 'On the Land Learning' sessions in south-western Ontario. These sessions, which were facilitated by Adrian Jacobs who is the senior leader for Indigenous Justice and Reconciliation, reinforce the importance of God's creation to Indigenous and non-indigenous people alike. This past March, attendees immersed themselves in creation's beauty by gathering and moving chopped wood. They also spent time gathering the sweet nectar of maple trees and delivering it to an evaporator so it could be refined into syrup. Metis elder Dave Skene explained the intricacies of the boiling process and shared stories of the land, the Carolinian forest and the 'dish with One Spoon' wampum belt.

Adrian Jacobs led another 'On the Land Learning' session in May at the Six Nations reserve. Adrian used the example of a local gypsum mine to explain how the environment can be harmed by the extraction industry. He also spent time discussing various Haudenosaunee

wampum belts and their associated histories and stories.

Urban Indigenous Ministries

Your prayers and gifts help sustain these ministries so they can continue to be a place of hope and healing in their respective communities. They would not exist without your continued support.

The **Winnipeg Indigenous Family Centre** continues to connect with community members by facilitating sharing circles, traditional Indigenous crafts and hamper distributions. The centre has also been able to

offer family programs such as bingo nights and beach days. Shannon Perez, who is the director of the centre, is appreciative of local organizations that support the centre such as the Winnipeg Goldeyes baseball team. The team answered the request for game tickets for the centre's Kids Club program by providing more tickets than the centre could use. The centre offers a unique program called 'Circle of Security', that utilizes horses to teach parenting skills. This program has proven to be effective for Indigenous parents who were never parented themselves due to childhoods spent in residential schools. This parenting program followed the establishment of a similar program for children called "Stable Connections'. In partnership with a local horse ranch, this program utilizes animal assisted therapy to help Indigenous children deal with stress.

August witnessed a phenomenal change at the Regina Indigenous Christian Fellowship

Centre. After 32 years as the executive director of the centre, Bert Adema has retired and passed the reigns to Joe Elkerton. Joe is a member of the Chippawas of the Thames First Nation. Joe's parents, who both survived the trauma of Indian residential school, abandoned him as a child

and he ended up living on the street. His life on the streets was miraculously transformed when he was introduced to Jesus. Joe began working with the Salvation Army and eventually became pastor of an Indigenous church which has blossomed into the Ekklesia International Ministry. Joe started a safe house for female victims of human trafficking and has helped Indigenous families navigate the child welfare system. Along with certificates in recreational leadership and business, Joe holds a Bachelor of Religious Education from Tyndale University.

A major part of the **Edmonton Native Healing Centre's** (ENHC) programming involves the provision of basic needs for local people. Food hampers from the Edmonton food bank are distributed at the centre 2 times per week. The centre also provides opportunities for community members to learn new recipes with the bonus of taking home the prepared dishes. Wednesdays are soup and Bannock days where attendees gather in prayer before consuming between 60-90 bowls of soup. Pastor Harold Roscher, who directs the centre, is clear that the centre

goes beyond just providing food. The centre's staff include 2 mental health counsellors and Radius Health, which partners with the ENHC, uses the centre to provide medical health clinics 3 days per week. The centre is currently renovating their prayer room under the banner of

'Strengthening our Spirit'. The grand opening of the space, scheduled for October 1, 2025, will enhance the centre's ability to address the prayer and ceremony needs of the community.

- 2. This past summer we noticed a significant downturn in the number of ships passing through the Port of Vancouver. I'm not sure what the reason is for that. Summer is generally a bit quieter for ship traffic, but this summer showed a particularly marked decrease. It does offer us some flexibility however for longer visits on other ships which can lead to longer, deeper and more meaningful conversations at times. It also gives more opportunity for repeat visits, which can also be helpful. And with summer holidays it can make time off for our staff more flexible. It will be interesting to see how things shape up for the Fall, which is often one of our busiest seasons.
- 3. A recent report from the ITF has demonstrated how shore leave opportunities for seafarers are significantly decreasing around the world. Several factors play into this unfortunate trend, including: small crews with heavy workloads, increasing numbers of

inspections on board which can be very time consuming both in preparation and implementation, as well as more efficient loading and discharging of cargo which makes the time in port busier and means shorter stays. There is real concern that action needs to be taken to ensure that seafarers can have real quality time off from their jobs and have the time needed to get a break from their ships. Officers on board typically find it especially difficult to have enough time to get away from their ships. Stress on board is a growing issue.

4. We held another port tour this summer, where about 70 people joined us on the evening of June 28 for a tour of the inner harbour. This event was also planned to celebrate the 55th year of official service as the Ministry to Seafarers. It was a beautiful evening for an informative tour, with lots of good fellowship and food to go with it.



- 5. The **Christmas at Sea** season is fast approaching. Our Fall newsletter gives more information on that, so please encourage your congregations to support this project. Also, we will be including personal Christmas cards with the gifts again this year. If a Sunday School class wishes to get involved, or even a Christian school in your area, a small group, or even individuals, please contact Gary for more info, and/or go to our website ministrytoseafarers.com under the "get involved" menu. We need lots of Christmas cards.
- 6. Recently I visited a ship with 5 female crew members on board. That is the most I have yet encountered on a cargo ship, and it speaks to a slow but sure growing trend towards more women on board. At a recent staff meeting we recognized the very real need for a female presence on our staff.
- 7. In May NAMMA held a one-day regional conference here in Vancouver. Nearly 30 attended, with ship visitors and board members from our Anglican, Catholic and CRC partner ministries, as well as from Lighthouse Harbour Ministries (also Vancouver) and other visitors from Victoria, Bellingham, Seattle, Tacoma and Portland. It was a really good day together of learning and sharing.

Greetings from Calvin University! Here are some of the tangible outcomes and impacts of the great education our students receive at Calvin.

- #1 undergraduate teaching institution in the Midwest this year according to U.S. News & World Report.
- Calvin is one of six schools among the 140 colleges and universities that make up the CCCU (Coalition of Christian Colleges & Universities) in the U.S. to be recognized with a Research Classification by Carnegie.
- 3 students received the prestigious Goldwater Scholarship This number matches that of the University of Chicago.
- Another year where our student athletes finished in the top 10 of 425 NCAA Division 3 colleges and universities with the number of academic all-Americans.
- Medical School:
 - o 97% interview rate
 - 88% acceptance rate (national is 41%)
 - we have two students on a waitlist that we hope still gain acceptance
- PA School
 - 77% interview rate
 - 62% acceptance rate (national is 31%)
- PT School 87.5% acceptance rate, National average is 50-70%
- Dental School 100% acceptance rate, National average is 59%
- OT School 100% acceptance rate, National average is 20 25%
- Pharmacy 100% acceptance rate
- Optometry 100% acceptance rate

All of the board meetings this past year have been primarily focused on preparing the board's report to synod. Here are a few things I'd like to share with everyone.

- Calvin was represented by two trustees Perrin Rynders and Shirley Hoogstra, and three members of cabinet Provost Noah Toly, Pastor Mary Hulst and President Greg Elzinga.
- The Calvin representatives reported that they witnessed a spirit of openness and eagerness to partner with Calvin. Synod expressed appreciation for the thought and effort that had gone into Calvin's report but asked the University to provide further explanation on one item and report back to Synod 2026.

About the April board meeting...While there were other standard parts of most board meetings – committee reports, celebrating employee service anniversaries, approving new faculty appointments, etc., the board also spent a good chunk of time on the budget...both for the upcoming academic year and beyond.

Your continued prayers are requested for Calvin (that it may remain true to its mission of training young men and women for service to Christ, and for continued good enrollment numbers).

Report to Classis Alberta South/Saskatchewan of the Christian Reformed Church: Fall 2025

Greetings from The King's University! The campus is alive with nearly 300 new students who just began their studies at King's and 550 returning students continuing their journey toward earning a degree. New programs are being offered and the construction of our new facility continues to progress. We are thankful for God's continued blessings on King's and for the faithful partnership of our supporting community who are essential to the continued success of this university.

Construction of our new Centre for Excellence in the Sciences is progressing on schedule. The exterior of the building is expected to be fully enclosed by November with construction completion slated for next July. We are thrilled to see this new addition to campus taking shape and are very excited about the new opportunities it will create for King's. New laboratories, additional instructional classrooms, collaborative research space, and faculty and administrative office spaces will all be a part of this new construction. This past July, King's received final approval to offer a Bachelor of Kinesiology degree. The program equips students for careers in recreation, athletic performance, and health science and builds upon King's strong reputation in the natural and social sciences. "Students who have a passion for sport and exercise will learn about the beauty of human motion through this program," says Dr. Kris Ooms, Vice President of Academics and Research. "King's is bringing a Christ-centred perspective to the field of kinesiology by exploring how God created the human body, and how motion and exercise can be acts of worship." King's approach to the field of kinesiology stresses holistic connections between physical, mental, and spiritual wellness.

The King's University is excited to announce the launch of a new 3-Year Bachelor of Arts in Business Administration. This condensed program is designed to equip students with the essential skills and ethical principles necessary for today's dynamic business environment and will appeal to entrepreneurial-minded students as well as those seeking careers in business upon graduation. Administered through the Leder School of Business, this new program offers a comprehensive curriculum in areas of finance, entrepreneurship, and business management. Like its 4-Year Bachelor of Commerce counterpart, the 3-Year B.A. emphasizes experiential learning opportunities like annual case competitions and business conferences that prepare students for success post-graduation.

Dr. Darcy Visscher has been granted a position as a tier 2 Canada Research Chair in Urban Ecology here at The King's University. Funding of \$600,000 over 5 years will support his research team as they explore ways that animals are impacted by urbanization. Studies will look at Urban Rabit populations, disease transmission between coyotes and dogs, stress levels of birds in various urban settings and much more. Darcy has been a member of the King's faculty for years and sees his role as helping humans better understand our fellow creatures and live into our calling as stewards of God's good world. It is exciting to see his research recognized at this level.

This spring, King's launched its Sustainability Transformation Action and Research (STAR) Hub. Bringing together academic, societal, and governmental partners from around the world, STAR Hub advances creative sustainability research by exploring, supporting, and implementing alternative pathways to sustainability. STAR Hub is actively preparing to launch a range of new projects, including one focused on agroecology. When it comes to agricultural sustainability transitions, small operations often lack the necessary resources to keep up with their larger counterparts. By researching ways to connect local farmers with tools, knowledge, and community partners, STAR Hub will empower small-scale agriculture to match the sustainability efforts of large-scale competitors. Dr. Adrian Beling, STAR Hub Director and Canada Research Chair in Transition to Sustainability, believes King's is uniquely positioned to enter the work of taking action towards sustainability transitions that are essential for building a better world.

Quinte's call: An Ecclesiastical Gathering of Canadian CRC's

Over the years there have been repeated conversations about the unique position of the CRC in Canada as part of the CRCNA. Gayla Postma has written an excellent piece outlining this history found here.

Classis Quinte is continuing to explore this unique history, and has expressed a desire to explore the unique place that churches in Canada share together with an overture in late in 2024. The specifics overture passed by Classis Quinte is found here:

Here is a brief summary of key points of this overture and how it is coming together

- Call together a gathering of Canadian CRC for matters of Mutual concern.
 - This gathering is to be
 - Grassroots driven by local councils and classes
 - Within ecclesiastical structures Following church order & honouring the roles that ecclesiastical bodies play (Church order article 44 a).
 - Fully transparent and collaboratively with the Canada Corp
 - A place for delegates to discern matters of mutual concern (or opportunity) across Canada
 - A delegated body, with authority to make decisions to be brought back to classes, or up to Synod
 - This gathering will guard against
 - Rehashing recent decisions of Synod
 - Creating a separate Canadian denomination
- There are many parallels between this proposal and the Canadian National Gathering, with a few distinctives
 - A grassroots movement, designed by the Canadian Classes (ie agenda is not set by the Canada Corp or Burlington office)
 - A delegated body with voting privileges
 - We are considering how this could be included with and/or augment the Canadian National Gathering. All of the data gathered will be shared with the Canada Corp.
- The purpose of this specific communication before each classis right now is 3 fold
 - 1. Determine the interest / viability across Canada for this initiative
 - 2. Discern what areas of mutual concern are held across Canada
 - 3. Discern how this gathering will function in conjunction with the Canadian National Gathering.

We hope that the feedback each classis provides will enable us to chart a path forward for this initiative. Thank you for your time and consideration!
